Western Division AFS

The Western Division (WDAFS) has been quite active in number of areas during 1986-87. One of the major focal point has been the concerted effort by the Division and the Chapters to make our relationship viable, active and responsive to member needs and concerns. The Division officers attended eleven of sixteen chapter meetings and in every case a portion of the travel costs were paid by the chapters. Also, the twelve of the sixteen chapters sent representatives to the second annual WDAFS ExCom Retreat. These are a few examples of the strong commitment by the Chapters and the Division to develop a healthy productive relationship for the betterment of the Society. Further evidence of this will be presented throughout the remainder of this Annual Report.

#### WDAFS ExCom Retreat

The second annual WDAFS Excom Retreat was held for a full day and evening the day prior the start of the annual meeting in Salt Lake City, Utah. WDAFS President-Elect Al Mills and the Bonneville Chapter were instrumental in making the retreat extremely successful. Twenty AFS dignitaries were present and actively participated, they included: officers from twelve of the Division's chapters, all five of the Division's officers, three officers from the Parent Society, AFS Deputy Director and two of

the candidates for the Parent Society.

We spent the morning at the motel, while the afternoon and evening were enjoyed at the Wasatch Mtn. House, which is located at 8000 ft. elevation. Discussions were extremely spirited and candid, and beer was not allowed until 4:15 p.m. The agenda is attached for reference (See attachment).

Communications among the AFS subunits emerged as the largest concern. The Oregon Chapter presented a white paper on the structure of AFS and how well it serves our needs (See attachment). A long discussion followed with various veiwpoints expressed. These mainly involved Chapter concerns about being truly the grassroots of AFS, and a "parent" concern that our structure is a result of evolution based on need, e.g., a large Parent Society ExCom. The afternoon session then focused on specific solution to this general problem. The Oregon Chapter paper was not acted on but was the reason for much of the action in the afternoon. The following actions were voted on:

- 1. It was approved that there should be an WDAFS ExCom retreat held in conjuction with the annual meeting. Also, the recommendation was approved that each chapter fund the travel for its President and President-Elect to attend the annual WDAFS meeting and participate in the ExCom Retreat to represent their constituency. It was passed that the WDAFS officers should attend as many chapter meetings as possible. It was agreed that a draft should be prepared to evaluate approaches for funding this travel.
- 2. After considerable discussion on riparian issues, it was <u>passed</u> that <u>WDAFS</u> will <u>sponsor</u> within the next year, a <u>riparian</u> training workshop to increase the competency level of biologists on a more widespread basis. The workshop will focus on case histories with emphasis on past failures and 'real world' problems. The target audience will be field biologists. It was noted that this workshop could be held a day or two prior the 1988 joint WDAFS/Western Association of Fish and Wildlife Agencies annual meeting in Albuquerque, N.M.
- 3. The issue of <u>AFS endorsement</u> of <u>oil and gas exploration</u> on the Outer Continental Shelf (OCS) and the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge raised considerable discussion on protocol within AFS. The following items were <u>passed</u> and forwarded to the Parent Society ExCom for <u>ACTION</u>:

- There is a need to add a section in the Chapter \* Α. President's Handbook on protocol relative to developing positions on issues and working with the Environmental Concerns Committee.
- That AFS staff will not take any position on OCS X B. development until an official AFS position has been established.
- Local Chapters will be notified of any meeting C. --regarding OCS development where AFS staff will be attending.
  - 4. The issue of AFS visibility was discussed at length, mostly revolving around public education and awareness of fishery resources. Ultimately, as the stewards on the Nation's most valuable renewable resource, we must instill a sense of prsonal responsibility for fisheries among all citizens. The following motion passed and is forwarded to the Parent Society ExCom for ACTION:
    - The AFS ExCom should provide funding for AFS to join Project WILD.

Membership Concerns was the next major area and the following items were discussed:

1. The topics of various dues policies among the Chapters and a dues rebate to the Chapters were discussed. The following motion was passed and forwarded on to the Parent Society ExCom for ACTION:

- 2. There was some discussion regarding student awareness of AFS and that the most activity needs to be focused at the Chapter level.
- 3. The Chapters expressed some concern about being able to get updated

membership lists in order to locate delinquent members. It was explained that these are available from the AFS home office, as are mailing labels. Also, it was noted that the WDAFS receives a monthly printout of new members, which could be passed on to the Chapters.

4. The idea of meeting with other professional societies was briefly discussed.

### WDAFS ANNUAL MEETING

An excellent program and quality arrangements were provided at the WDAFS annual meeting in Salt Lake City, Utah. It was a joint meeting with the Western Association of Fish and Wildlife Agencies (WAFWA). Utah Division of Wildlife Resources, the Bonneville Chapter AFS and WDAFS President-Elect Al Mills did an outstanding job and are to be commended. The theme of the meeting was "Surviving on a Shoestring". The meeting was well attended with 336 total registered of which 220 were AFS members.

Several additional items have been brought to my attention, which have caused the need for this amendment. First, we have some Chapter news of interest:

The Sacramento Chapter, which has 95% of its membeship comprised of members of the California-Nevada Chapter, has decided to become a subunit of the California-Nevada Chapter. The official paperwork will be forthcoming and will be quite similar as the format used by the Idaho Chapter.

Hawaii Chapter is alive and well. Their dissolution was proposed in a questionaire (self-addressed postcard) sent to all the AFS member living that geographic region by the WDAFS President. 66% responded in a positive manner to have an active chapter. It definitely got their attention and they are now planning quarterly meeting with a technical session planned for next winter. The Chapter had not had a meeting nor been officially heard from since 1984, so some kind of action appeared necessary, glad the worse did not come to pass.

The majority of the WDAFS Chapters are taking the necessary steps to insure that the U.S. Forest Service fisheries program "Rise to the Future -Fish Your National Forest" is adequately implemented. We are looking forward to a productive year assisting the Forest Service in its implementation of this new program.

At the WDAFS business meeting in Salt Lake City the membership voted to redirect the WDAFS contribution, \$500.00, to the Skinner Memorial Fund to go now towards covering the costs of sponsoring the Frances J. Allen Scholarship Raffle in 1987. **ACTION ITEM:**
