Within the letter, the Oregon Chapter expresses its support for the goals and conceptual approach to ecosystem rehabilitation in the Klamath River Basin outlined in the Klamath Hydroelectric Settlement Agreement (KHSA) and the Klamath Basin Restoration Agreement (KBRA).

The purpose of this letter is to inform you that the Western Division of the American Fisheries Society (WDAFS) joins the Oregon Chapter in supporting the KHSA and KBRA, which include removal of dams, reintroduction of anadromous fish to the upper Klamath Basin, and ecosystem rehabilitation.
